



Michael Le Bas and Laurie, with the help of many other members and staff, worked tirelessly during the holiday season to get a good start on the things that need to be ready before we make the transition to ClubExpress.

It was quickly noted that something we've been talking about for a while, branding, should be at the top of the list. The branding process is essentially about creating a design, look or even a feel that will be distinctly Brock House Society. We've hired "BigBoldBrand" to help us with the plan and I believe it's money well spent. ClubExpress and creating a brand will significantly increase our productivity and efficiency.

You'll be hearing a lot more from me as the gameplan unfolds. In the meantime, don't hesitate to ask questions, lots of them. The Board of Directors believes that this project will serve the future of the Society and its members very well.

By the way, have you noticed the slogan "Where Seniors Stay Young" on the website or this newsletter? The Board adopted it late in 2016 and, as time passes, you may be seeing it more on posters, letterhead and so on. Heartfelt thanks go to Diana King for creating it.

We ended 2016 in the black: \$39,014.00's worth and the Brock House Restaurant was the primary contributor. During the November meeting, the Board of Directors agreed that 50% of any revenue should be transferred to our Care and Conservation Fund. This fund was established in 1993. "Its purpose is to provide funds to be used exclusively for the maintenance and improvement of Brock House" (Policy Manual 5.1). The money will be transferred after the annual audit is completed.

For some of you hearing the word "audit" may serve as a reminder that we're approaching our Annual General Meeting. This year it's on the afternoon of Wednesday, March 22 and David Eby, MLA for Vancouver-Point Grey, will be our speaker. He hasn't decided on a topic yet but given his many activities and associations with politicians of all stripes, he isn't short on subjects.

We're in the process of looking for members who may be interested in serving on the Board of Directors or a standing committee. The truth is, we're always looking for "talent". We know that our members are a particularly engaged group of people and we hope that if you haven't already joined the ranks of our many volunteers, you will very soon. It's a very rewarding experience.

I rarely write about the death of a member other than to express condolences to the family and friends on behalf of the Society (**Brock House Milestones**, **p. 11**). That's because everyone is precious and, given that we're in a seniors community, the reality is that death visits us often. I would, however, like to again encourage members to share milestones and memories with *The Gallimaufry*.

Please allow me this exception. Our Honorary President, Dr. Richard (Dick) Stace-Smith, OBC, died on January 17. One could easily write pages about his personal accomplishments and contributions to the community. Those of you who didn't know Dick will get a sense of the gentleman from this portion of his obituary:

"In 1999, he was honoured with the Order of British Columbia for his leadership to protect biodiversity and to conserve the environment for future generations. He was recognized and respected for his roles with Vancouver Natural History Society, BC Naturalists' Foundation, VanDusen Botanical Garden, Brock House Society and Fraser River Coalition among others....His gentle and understanding nature will be missed by his four children." - Vancouver Sun

Dick's wife, Joan, died in May 2015 and we still miss her. We'll miss them both for a long time to come. They gave so much to Brock House Society and could always be counted on for a great chat full of insight, candor and humour. I imagine that I'll still see him in his usual chair in the Halpern room and, in my heart, I'll still wave. Dick's Celebration of Life is on February 4 at West Point Grey United Church, 2:00 p.m.




### The Brock Table Tennis Class

Last autumn a small but enthusiastic group gathered regularly on Wednesday mornings to listen to Brock House members tell their immigration stories. Our speakers were the brave souls who had responded to the call-out for people willing to share their experiences. 'Brave' is not an understatement. It takes mettle to leave home, permanently, for the unknown but it can also be emotionally wrenching to reflect on the past and the effects of such life-altering decisions. Likewise it is nerve-wracking to stand and speak about it to strangers. Few of our volunteers were in professions that required public speaking - a daunting task that does not get easier with age.

Their diverse stories were fascinating: when, why and from where they emigrated? Why they chose Canada? If they were single or married; male or female; very young or mature; students or preemployed; arrived with transferable employment skills; spoke English or French or had to learn a language to find work; and if they had a support network here in Canada? We in the audience learned that each of these factors affected their immigration experiences. I was intrigued by the women who left their families behind and emigrated solo - from China, from Germany, from England. They were not accidental immigrants but determined individuals who left home to establish new lives for themselves. They were among the most satisfied with their choices to move to Canada despite early setbacks, for example: being told, despite her training and skills, "We don't hire women".

The effects of political instability and wars affected emigration decisions. One member came to Vancouver to visit her family, but could not return to Lebanon because a war broke out. She became a political refugee. Brock House employee, Nebojsa (Nesa) and his wife left Bosnia to provide their daughter a more secure future than was possible in the Balkans after the break-up of Yugoslavia. Brazil, Britain, Czechoslovakia, Chile, Germany, and South Africa are some other countries our speakers left due to past or incipient wars and social or political unrest.

One member traveled from India to the United States with a college scholarship to a Florida university. He hadn't even settled in before he was told, "Go to the back of the bus" because of his colour. He went - but not to the back of the bus. He traveled north until he reached Canada where his reception was more to his liking. He obtained his education and pursued a most successful career.

Only one family had to apply twice and endure a long wait before they were granted resident status. For others immigration was a fairly simple, straightforward process. Regardless of the ease with which most of the speakers were admitted as immigrants to Canada the adjustment was similar - an emotional roller-coaster. Even the one speaker who shared how eager she was to learn and adopt Canadian customs would have had to navigate cultural expectations that were foreign to her and not always understood by Canadians she approached for explanations.
