# Brock House Society to vote on revised Constitution and new Bylaws

The new Societies Act for B.C. which came into effect in November 2016 requires all registered societies to transition by November 2018 to a constitution and by-laws compliant with the new legislation.

The Governance Committee reviewed the Society's current Constitution and Bylaws against the requirements of the new legislation and found that, because of their age, they do not accommodate several issues raised by the new Act or, since Brock House is a registered charity for income tax purposes, some of the policies and procedures required by the Act relating to 'public funded' societies. Adjustments were also required to accommodate changes made in the Society's current strategic plan.

The Board therefore authorized the Governance Committee to revise the Constitution and prepare new Bylaws based on "Model Bylaws" made available for transitioning societies as a guide. A Draft Revised Constitution and New Bylaws for Brock House Society were completed last November and were subsequently reviewed by a lawyer to ensure full compliance with the Act.

The next step is for members to approve the Society's new Constitution and Bylaws by special resolution at this year's **Annual General Meeting**, **Wednesday**, **March 21**. In preparation for this vote, the Board and the Governance Committee invites members to attend an information session



# "How to Get Out of a Country without Paying Exit Fee"

My daughter and I were in Belgium. I can't remember the year. It was some time in 197-. I have been to Europe so often, it is difficult to remember the year.

Anyway it was during the time when the world was more peaceful and people were not so hustled. I can't remember why only my daughter and I were in Belgium but I think my husband had to attend a conference in Belgium and left earlier because teaching at the university did not give him time to sightseeing in the city.

So the mother and the daughter stayed longer, enjoyed themselves and the mother managed to spend all the money but 38 cents.

We got to the airport (I had saved the money for taxi fare.)

The line moved forward slowly.

We lined up together with other passengers.

I realized suddenly that other passengers were paying money to the customs officers.

"Oh, dear, what shall I do?" I said within myself but I did not move away from the line. I decided the best way is not make a fuss and stay calm. After all, I slithered through similar situations: when my fifteen-old sister (only one and half years older than I) and I had to travel from Beijing, China to Japan during the war, without papers or in 1956 when I landed in Austria without transit visa. (The travel from China to Japan requires another chapter.)

Finally it came to my turn.

The officer calculated how much I should pay. He said so much and so much.

"I don't have it." I said.

"Dollars will do", he said.

"I don't have it in dollars, either". By then the officer's eyes grew considerably larger.

"What have you, then?"

"Nothing. I have 38 cents." "But", I hastily added, "my husband is a professor at the university so as soon as I get back, I will send you the money."

The officer was quite for a moment but soon he said with a smile: "Passez, Madam."

He sent us off with a dandy wink.
